# **COP15** Biodiversity Conference Spotlight

The UN Convention on Biological Diversity (CBD) held its COP15 conference from December 7 - 19, 2022, in Montreal, Canada. COP15 was originally planned to take place in October 2020, in Kunming, China, but was delayed four times due to the pandemic and the logistical challenges it created. Governments from around the world, representing roughly 190 countries, attended the conference in order to create a new set of goals through which to guide global conservation efforts through 2030. Of primary concern to delegates was reversing loss of nature and biodiversity around the world in the next decade. The conference culminated in the creation of the Kunming-Montreal Global Biodiversity Framework (GBF), which includes 4 goals and 23 targets for 2030, related to conservation. Although commitments made at COP15 and in the GBF are legally non-binding, these goals and initiatives should form the foundation of any efforts going forward.

Preserving Earth's biodiversity is critical for sustainable living and is the core of nature-based solutions for solving climate change. Protecting biodiversity demands ensuring the ongoing health of ecosystems and wildlife populations globally, while regulating our own society so as not to encroach on or indirectly harm these areas. COP15 demonstrated that biodiversity is a social, economic, and political issue, and must be treated as such.

NHSCF Delegate Mina Adabag attended COP15 on behalf of EarthEcho International, to speak on the importance of youth advocacy and the 30x30 initiative, which seeks to put 30% of land and 30% of ocean on Earth under protection by 2030. COP15 concluded with nearly every country on Earth signing onto that initiative, in tandem with the GBF.

According to Mina's observations from the conference, the GBF is primarily based on past goals created at similar conferences. That being said, national delegates convened in a large hall and stated their positions on different aspects of each target. Much of the negotiation occurred related to punctuation and even specific words/terms, while the most contentious disagreements often fell on bracketed terms! Despite slow progress and a lack of legal means to enforce plans or goals, COP15 had tremendous theoretical success.

Notably, the U.S. did not send a national delegation to COP15 and U.S. delegates were forced to participate unofficially, as a result of domestic political objections. Biden's America the Beautiful Initiative captures many of our specific national conservation goals.

We decided to remove bins in classrooms so that students have to throw their garbage out in designated locations where information on garbage and recycling are all being shown at once, raising the chances of people noticing.
